


If You Can't Score a Table...

Rao's consumer goods are the next best thing to dining there

An East Harlem institution since 1896, Rao's was the definition of exclusivity, the pinnacle of "it" dining. Up until 2006, there were only 10 Rao's tables in the world—until the clouds parted and a light shone down upon Caesars Palace, where a second, larger Rao's

opened. But even if you still can't score that coveted table, you can take a piece of Rao's home with you.



Rao's progeny (and co-owner) Frank Pellegrino Jr. released *Rao's on the Grill* (\$35) over the summer, offering the family's unique take on barbecuing. If you're lucky, you might even be able to get Pellegrino (a frequent presence at the Caesars Palace location) to sign a copy himself.

There's a whole slew of other Rao's items, too,

including a signature sauce, marinades, pasta, red wine dressing, pizza sauce and roasted peppers. If you can't find it at the restaurant, check online. Also look out for the namesake Rao's wines, and raise a toast to the first family of Italian restaurants.
